On the job training

Our course is specifically designed by pioneers for pioneers. You'll get a chance to connect with experienced pioneer practitioners who want to see you flourish and your imagination channelled into action.

Our course provides a dynamic, supportive learning community that will be there for you as you process your learning, take risks in mission and reflect on your journey.



Creative Curriculum accredited through Durham University

Our course is designed to be flexible, so you don't have to stop doing while you are learning.

Our course will equip you for ground-breaking, transformational and sustainable mission, giving you what you need to initiate and follow through on mission projects that will help change lives.

"Dreamers that do"

Course founder Jonny Baker often refers to pioneers as "dreamers who do."

He set up the course over a decade ago in response to a need he saw to equip, support and give confidence to those working as pioneers.

Being a student at CMS

Teaching Format

All our teaching days for Undergraduate (Monday) and Postgraduate (Tuesday) kick off with a student led creative worship session from 10:30-11am, and teaching sessions are 11am-1pm; and 2-4pm.

Durham University

Our programmes are accredited through Durham University as part of a suite of Common Awards. The awards are taught in Theological Education Institutes (TEIs) all over the country; CMS is a TEI with Ripon College, Cuddesdon.

Plus Durham Uni annual student fee (which entitles you to a student card and access to nationwide student discounts and university libraries access). This fee is between £250-£450 pa or £85 pa if you are interested in becoming a licensed lay minister in the CofE.

Fees are payable upfront or by monthly standing order. Bursaries are available by application.

*N.B. The DTh is the only programme that is charged per year, all others are for the entire award.

Ordinands and Licensed Lay Ministers

Depending on the diocese you are in, you may be able to train to be an ordained minister of the Church of England, or a Licensed Lay Minister. If you are not CofE, your denomination may have a different process, but you still may be able to train with CMS.



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Undergraduate Modules

Certificate - level 4 modules

Foundations for Theology and Reflective Practice - an introduction to contextual theology, principles and methods of reflection, and their place in mission and practice (online).

Pastoral Care, Ethics and Ministry - an introduction to key issues in both pastoral care and ethics, giving you the tools and theological framework to approach pastoral situations, as well as the space to reflect on your own views and experiences.

Mission and Evangelism - puts the Bible in conversations with culture to help us gain greater understanding about our own practice of mission, looks at historical trends and current approaches to engaging and witnessing to the world around us, along with practical engagement in mission (online with weekend residential).

Introduction to Church History - an overview of church history and its social, cultural, and political context, helping you see how history might have shaped your practice and experience.

Introduction to the Bible - an overview of the purpose, context and content of the Old and New Testaments, becoming familiar with approaches to biblical study and considering how to engage biblical texts in mission and ministry.

Spirituality and Discipleship - explores different approaches to discipleship, considering various Christian spiritual practices and their impact on our individual spiritual lives, and how we might engage practically with them in our lives and the lives of our community (week residential).

Pathways - focused certificate

Pioneer Focus (see above)

African Theology Focus - The same modules as above (each taught with an African theology focus), with a Black Theology module and a African Theology module replacing Pastoral Care & Ethics (fully online) .

Chaplaincy - The same modules as above (each taught with a chaplaincy focus), with a chaplaincy module replacing Church History.

Children & Families - The same modules as above (each taught with a C&F focus), with a C&F module replacing Church History.

New Housing - The same modules as above (each taught with a New Housing focus), with a New Housing module replacing Church History.

Youth - The same modules as above (each taught with a Youth focus), with a Youth module replacing Church History.

Undergraduate Modules

Diploma - level 5 modules

Leadership and Theology for Ministry and Mission - explores theories and skills in leadership, considering them from a theological and mission focused perspective, integrating Biblical and pastoral approaches to leadership, and reflecting on how these can inform your practice (online)

Mission Entrepreneurship (also known as Make Good) - an introduction to social enterprise and its relevance in mission. A residential week to enable you, with the guidance of experienced practitioners, to take an idea from conception to the initial stages of a business plan (week residential)

Missional Ecclesiology - an introduction to historical and theological perspectives of ecclesiology and the ways in which the missional church has consistently implemented new approaches, including the opportunity to see how this works out in pioneering settings

Missional Theology in Global Context - considers theology and approaches to mission from a global perspective and examines contemporary culture, seeing how important understanding context is for our own missional practice (online)

Bible in Context - explores different approaches to interpreting the Bible and how to read in light of both its original and subsequent contexts, looks at how Old and New Testaments can be related to each other, and applies this learning to your own engagement with the Bible (week residential)

Developing Ministry and Worship in Context - this module links with your own work or placement to deepen your knowledge and understanding of Christian worship, develop practical skills, and equip you in leading worship, preaching and pastoral care in your context.

Placement - an opportunity to do a placement in a context or church setting that is different to your own context or prior experience. It's your choice where you go and you get to spend total 35 hours on the placement - over the year, or one week, or month, this country or overseas - a chance to do something different.

Undergraduate Modules

BA - level 6 modules

The Bible and Christian Faith - explores key themes and critically examines key thinkers in the study of both Old and New Testaments and how think about it with regards to our faith (online).

Chaplaincy and Contemporary Christian Mission - explores the distinctive ministry of chaplaincy in mission, including an opportunity to experience a chaplaincy context (online)

Theological Perspectives: Community Development - offers space for dialogue and theological reflection on approaches to community development, as well as opportunities to study and visit specific initiatives (online + weekend residential tbc)

Justice, Environment and Mission in a Global Context - examines Christian engagement in issues of justice, development and the environment, addressing theology and missional practice, and offers the opportunity to reflect on the implications in your own context (week residential)

The Creative Arts and Christian Ministry and Mission - explores the theological and philosophical discourses of art and Christianity. Aimed at mission or ministry practitioners, it further explores the potential of engagement with the arts to express, connect and create opportunity for mission and ministry.

Dissertation - is a piece of work of 12,000-15,000 words enable you to follow an area of interest in depth.

Postgraduate Modules

MA with a Pioneer focus

(in Oxford, Hybrid or fully online)

Anthropology and Christian Mission - an introduction to culture, context and worldview. You will develop your own reflexive capacity in relation to your cultural background and behaviour.

Reflective Practice: Leadership and Collaboration - equips you to discern appropriate models of leadership and evaluate your own experience in leadership. Material is drawn from both secular and Christian contexts.

Reflective Practice: Mission and Evangelism - an opportunity to gain a solid grasp of missiology and to engage with current mission issues through exploration of themes and metaphors. It will also help you to reflect missiologically on your own context and experience.

Mission and Ecclesiology in Contemporary Context - explores the role and mission of the church both historically and in the contemporary world, bringing your experience into conversation with various perspectives.

Research and Reflection: Resources and Methods - and introduction to various research methods and approaches to theological reflection. There will be an opportunity to design a research project.

Theologies in Global Perspective - helps us to engage in theology in current global perspectives on the Bible, faith and mission.

Political Theology for Mission - this module gives the opportunity for in-depth engagement with a range of issues around church, mission and society.

Dissertation (for all MA options)- this is completed in the third year of study. It is a piece of work of 12,000-15,000 words enable you to follow an area of interest in depth.

MA with an African Theology focus

(Fully online)

Advanced Topic in Church History - a course designed to help students study a particular era of church history with particular reference to Africa.

Christianity and Indigenous Religious Traditions - a course designed to help students undertake an in-depth study of an indigenous religious tradition from the Global South, how such a religious tradition relates to culture and shapes a people's identity, and how it finds expression in orality, rituals and artistic forms using music and dance.

Global Pentecostalism - A course designed to help students engage in a systematic and comprehensive study of the nature of Pentecostal and charismatic types of Christianity.

Mission and Ecclesiology in Contemporary Context - a course designed to help students reflect on the role and mission of the church both historically and in the contemporary world bringing their own experience into conversation with various perspectives.

Research and Reflection: Resources and Methods - a course designed to introduce students to various research methods and approaches to theological reflection. There will be an opportunity to design a research project.

Reflective Practice: Leadership and Collaboration - a course designed to enable students to discern appropriate models of leadership and evaluate their own experience in leadership. Material is drawn from both secular and Christian contexts.
